My mother and my sister shopped big time. Afterwards the clerk came over to me and said "Thank you for bringing

You know how I had said I hoped not to hear "I'm bored Aunt Diane." Well, it did not quite work out that way. We stopped at the Cowboy and Western Heritage Museum in Oklahoma City. We were looking at a gallery of modern day photographs taken along the Lewis and Clark trail. In the middle they had little settees for people to sit and just look, so the kids were going from one to another. This was not a great photography trip. I never did see that quintessential Texas Hill Country scene of a big green pasture filled with Texas Bluebonnets and Oak Trees. ETHICS IN NATURE PHOTOGRAPHY

The following is reprinted from The Art & Craft of Nature Photography, a series of reprints from the Minnesota Nature Photography Club newsletter.

- 1. Be considerate of your subjects, animal, vegetable, or mineral. Killing or injuring any living thing is improper conduct.
- 2. Be courteous to your fellow photographers. Obtain permission before trespassing on and where free access is not customary.
- 3. Be familiar with the life history and the geographic setting of your subjects. Complex life forms and rare species call for a greater knowledge and respect.
- 4. Be abiding of requests and signage by rangers or wardens in national and state parks or wildlife refuges.

- 5. Be protective of all wildflowers, not only those protected by statutory law. A competent photographer never needs to pick a wildflower.
- 6. If rocks, logs, or natural things are brought in to enhance the scientific background of a picture, they should be returned to their original place.
- 7. Simplifying or gardening the immediate area of a picture does not include pulling up, cutting off, or otherwise destroying other plants. Kneeholes and toe scuffing should be prevented.
- 8. Avoid trampling fragile habitat such as grasslands, marshes and wildflower patches. Damage to an ecosystem affects all of its resident species.
