N4C President's Message

Hello Everyone!!!

Ok, I give up. Old Man Winter has won and can go home now. He just came again in full force and it seems like there is no end in sight. We're been telling our kids that this is like the winters we had growing up. At least my snow blower has been working like a champ so far.

So did everyone dig up a light bulb/socket and try your hand at some still life shots? I didn't think so. I think still life photographs are great to play with on the computer. It's fun to take a photo and go though the filters on your photo editor (or plug-ins that you've bought or found on the Internet). It's usually a hit and miss, mostly misses, but you come up with something good every so often.

I have favorite filters that I try first on a new photo. Posterize was an early favorite. I've got several different kinds of Solarization filters that I use a lot. On any filters, try changing the hues/saturation or try turning to b&w. Try a brown tone for an old look. Ever try blending layers? Take a photo, make a duplicate layer & change the top layer. Then change the blending modes. If you like magazines with lots of techniques, try "Digital Photo." It's from England and I find it at Barnes and Noble. It even comes with a CD with videos of all the techniques shown in that issue.

The trick is to match the right filter or technique to the right photograph. Sometimes you can come up with 2 or 3 good possibilities in an evening or you can go for weeks without anything worth keeping.

Have you checked out the links page on the N4C web site? Ken has all kinds of places to look for new techniques and ideas.

Don't forget to work (or start) on your photo essav.

Make sure you save the last weekend in April for Springbrook. It's a great weekend of photography and fun.

Some Tips to Keep in Mind

- Keep the camera handy. You can't take a picture if you don't have a camera. Also, have plenty of film for the same reason.
- Hold the camera steady. If you can't, brace yourself or use a tripod.
- Keep the camera level.
- Move in close to the subject and fill the frame with it. Usually it is more interesting if the subject is active and doing something.
- Keep the photograph as simple as possible. An uncluttered background helps the viewer stay focused on your main center of interest.
- Try to tell a story with your picture.
- Foreground objects give depth to a picture. Use trees, flowers, or people for example to give dimension to the shot.
- Most people pictures work best if kept at their eye level. For kids, get down to their level.
- Panning or following your subject with the camera is a creative technique for action.
- Action is easier to stop if it is moving toward or away from the camera.

N4C Slate of Directors 2008 - 2009

Director #1—Ken Johnson

I have been the Chair of the N4c Digital Slide Contests sine their inception, currently the N4C Webmaster, Director 2, and a member of the Digital Advisory Committee. As a member of the Central Iowa Camera Club (Marshalltown, IA) for 14 years I served several terms as president of that club. My 30 year old SLR was beyond repair. I was looking at auto-focus and auto-exposure SLR's and needed help. CICC members came to the rescue. That is when I joined—a step as important as the camera selection to improving my photography. I moved to Ankenny, IA, in 2005, and now I also am a member of the Des Moines Camera Club. It was a natural transition because I had already made many friends through N4C. In my retirement as a mechanical engineer, I am fascinated with all aspects of digital photography. The N4C objective established 50 years ago for the "advancement of its members in the knowledge and practice of the science and art of photography" is just as relevant today. Digital technology initiated a revival of photography with interest and education opportunities abounding for clubs and N4C.

Director #2—Gerald Bonsack

I have been a member of the La Crosse Area Camera Club since 1987, and over the years I have held various offices and chaired many sessions. Recently I have also chaired the Contemporary Slides & Prints Category for N4C, as well as doing numerous workshops at Springbrook or the fall convention.

In 1999 I was one of 3500 photographers selected worldwide to shoot for "The Dawn of the Millennium" photo book project. Three of my photographs were selected for their website, and one was used in the book. On a national level I was the featured artist in the premier edition of *Kaleidoscope Review*, on a text panel at Carnegie Science Center, and recently had a letter/photograph published in *Popular Photography*. I have also promoted photography by speaking at the local schools, showing work publicly on regional television and in print.

The Importance of Judging Correctly & Constructively

Hello, out there in N4C land!

I am writing this because I have received more than a few comments on the judgings this year. I don't know whether some people are still prejudiced against digital or are just not paying attention to the judging rules.

We are supposed to judge on three criteria: **technique, composition and interest**. I have seen images this year with scores in the 20s that were technically correct with good composition. It looks like they were judged using the "I don't like it" method. Some of the comments are "nice image," "good shot," and "I like it," but then have a score of 24. If the score is that low, there should be a comment on why it was scored low, not "good shot."

We have some of our older members along with new members who are just getting active in digital and doing very good work. They have entered N4C contests and have a very nice image come back with a 19 on it with no comment. I have seen several instances of this and the scores are unexplainable. I read all the comments that come back on our club images and find many lacking in any substance.

We are a learning club and I hate to see member's images cut down just because somebody thinks they digitally manipulated something that makes it less of an image. While "over manipulated," "over saturated," and "over sharpened" have their merit as comments, I feel that these are becoming catch phrases used indiscriminately.

I think the majority of digital printers are like me; I use digital for its ease of printing and lower cost. I would rather spend my time taking images, not "creating" them on the computer. There are those who spend many hours manipulating a single image and that's OK, but just because you do digital doesn't mean you should be scored down.

In closing, I ask you judging clubs to **read the** judging rules and definitions each time you judge a contest. Follow the judging criteria: technique, composition and interest. I just ask you to judge with open minds and opened eyes.

Located in Springbrook State Park near Guthrie, Center, Iowa

Our first VP, Curt Stoever, has been busy lining up interesting and informative sessions for schedule us to attend. There will be still-life set-ups arranged by **Bob Rude**. We will be able to photograph incense vapors using techniques taught by **Gerry Bonsack**.

The 2008 Photo Essay entries will be viewed on Sunday morning.

If there happens to be a topic on the agenda that doesn't tickle your fancy, remember we will be located in an 800 acre park where you can walk or drive around to explore the area for your own photo ops. The park has a river, spring fed lake, ponds, and rolling hills of prairie and woodlands containing deer, raccoons, fox, pheasants, water birds, turkeys, and many other wild creatures (not including us).

Some photographers among us have been known to get up before dawn for those special photo ops. They usually aren't the same ones who stay up late to play cards. The all-inclusive registration fee is \$84 again this year. For those members with an aversion to sleeping in dorms, the fee is \$69. The \$69 registrants will need to find their own rooms at motels in outlying communities or make arrangements with the DNR to camp in the park campground. N4C does not handle campground fees.

The \$69 N4C registration pays for your meals and your share of the classroom facilities. The \$84 registration pays for meals, dorm rooms, and the use of the classrooms for the entire weekend. What a deal!

This year's weekend begins around 3 PM Friday, April 25, and lasts until about 1 PM Sunday, April 27. You will be able to check in and pick up your name tag and the weekend schedule in the dining hall after you arrive.

Springbrook has a cluster of five park buildings which were built during the CCC era. To find the dining hall, follow the sidewalk on the left from the large paved parking area. Bypass the sidewalk spur that goes to two dorms on the left. Stay on the main walk which will lead you to the large dining hall ahead and on your left. You will want the entrance door at the far end.

At 3:30, the N4C officers and Directors will begin their business meeting in the next building after the dining hall building. Anyone who is not interested in observing this meeting will have free time to pick out their bed in our assigned dorms and explore the park until dinner, which is scheduled at 6:30 PM.
