N4C Panorama Print Contest - Springbrook, 2010

Panorama Print Rules

- 1. A Panorama print is considered to be a photographic print with an aspect ratio greater than 2:1.
- 2. Open contest, any subject, mode or process, Color or Black & White.
- 3. The print may be produced by the entrant or by a commercial laboratory.
- 4. Prints may be of any size or shape **not to exceed 320 square inches.** The print **MUST** be mounted with the size of the mount **not to exceed 320 square inches.**
- 5. Any contingency not covered by these rules will be referred to the Chair of the Panorama Print Competition, whose interpretation and decision will be final.
- 6. Ribbons will be awarded according to current N4C judging club rules. Points will count towards Club of the Year and Photographer of the Year.
- 7. To reduce cost and problems with mailing oversize prints, this contest will require that entrants deliver their entries to Springbrook; either, in person or make arrangements to have them delivered and picked up afterwards. No prints will be returned by mail

How many camera bodies do you have in your basement? One night this week I checked our basement and rediscovered four 35mm SLR bodies. Even with a mere gaze I remembered all the things I really liked about each one and why I didn't try to trade these on the next model that caught my eye. The Canon T70 I recall because it was the first SLR with a motor drive integrated in a compact body that could be used in



Program mode or completely manual. I had two of these and then found a Canon



T90 used. The T90 was incredibly versatile, fast, and build like a tank. Then Canon changed their lens design (larger diameter so that faster lens designs could be produced). I saved two of the SLR bodies from this series. My absolute favorite was the Canon RT--a pellicle mirror, extremely quiet, little vibration, fast and wonderful for working a room and staying invisible. The second all time favorite was the A2e--eye controlled auto focus point--move your eye to the subject of interest and that's where the camera focused. It took a little time to

'train' for a different set of eyes, but it was fast, and the auto focus worked like a charm. In N4C land we have many of these gems--35mm SLR's-- in use every day. I think in particular of slides with their unique patina of colors built during the development process. Chemistry at it's finest. As we say, if you enjoy it, keep doing it!

I don't have a similar 'stable' of retired digital camera bodies waiting for a glance when I'm in the basement. I've had many digital camera bodies--traded the old one in on the next version at 18 month intervals for more years than I care to tell Jayne about. Technology has improved each succes-

sive model mostly for the good--and who would want to keep using the outdated model? The outdated models also found their way to son's, daughters and in-laws who are still using them. I don't feel the need to have every new model now--but I'm also attracted to new technology and the challenge of mastering something new.

Digital processing has evolved, carrying individual creative control to the Mt. Everest level. Are we in N4C keeping up? **Probably not.** During

the past year or two it's become obvious that automated digital processing to produce images and prints aren't winning contests as easily as a year or two ago. I reviewed my notes from last fall's N4C convention and started trying new approaches for taking and processing digital image files. My pre-



diction: 1--exposure latitude in single images will expand dramatically with adoption and use of HDR (bob cat-3 image stack) processing and 2 --sharp(er) focus using software that combines 'in focus' areas of multiple images (orchid stack of 14 images) will become more common. Yes, there is much to look forward to in N4C land.



How Good Is Your Color Perception? Part 3

As photographers we strive for color accuracy. We try to eliminate color casts and reproduce colors to look natural or as we remember them when our photo was taken.

In Part 1 of this series we looked rather seriously at how we see. You tried some tests to determine if you had areas of color vision deficiency. In Part 2 we had a bit more fun and found that we are sometimes fooled by our perceptions. In this Part 3, I want to explore more about how we view color. I have a video presentation by Beau Lotto on this topic for you to watch. Lotto says, "We have no direct access to our physical world other than through our senses. And the light that falls onto our eyes is determined by multiple things in the world - not only the color of objects, but also the color of their illumination - the color of the space between us and these objects. You vary any one of those parameters and you'll change the color of the light that falls onto your eye."



Lotto goes on to say, "The light that falls onto your eye – sensory information – is meaningless because it could mean literally anything. It's what we do with sensory information that really matters. How do we see? We see by learning to see....."

What's the Buzz about the N4C Yuku Forum

The new N4C Forum you have been reading about is on the web at http://n4c.yuku.com/. You can look at it any time you like. However until you join and become a member, you are considered to be just "lurking". Won't you join and become a friend? We only have 19 registered so far even though we have had over 24,000 views. Won't you help us grow? Join now and become an N4C Forum member.

Why would you want to be a member? You can then participate by replying, asking questions, starting a new topic, and commenting on the photos of a friend to name a few reasons. Another big benefit is that you can be notified by email when there is a new post. This is what makes it a "News Bulletin Board" about N4C. It is a way we can stay in touch during the year!

How do you become a member? There are two easy steps.

- 1. **First**, Click the "**SIGN UP**" button at the top.
- 2. Fill in the short Yuku (Yuku is our provider for this service) form.
 - a. "Username" is the name you want to appear when you post or make a reply. You can be as anonymous as you like. For example I have set up two usernames "N4CWebGuy" and "Ken J DMCC".
 - b. "Email address" This is needed to subscribe to the news.
 - c. "Password" This protects your user account.
 - d. In your personal profile, you can choose who can view each bit of information Everybody, No One, or Just Me.
- 3. Now LOG IN with the button at the top.
- **4. Second**, there is one more step to becoming a registered member. You must **reply or post something**. Search for "guest book" in the space next to the "SEARCH ALL" button then click it. That will take you to the guest book topic. Click on the underlined words to open the guest book. Scroll down to read greetings from others. At the bottom click the "ADD REPLY" button. You can fill in a title which will show in bold at the top of your post and then enter your message. The row of icons will help you customize your message if you want to get fancy. You can "PREVIEW" how your post will appear before finalizing it with the "POST" button. You will also have the ability to edit and delete your own posts at any time.
- 5. That is all there is to it. Scroll back to the top of the page. Just below the heading is a line that begins: "<u>N4C</u> >". That is referred to as the "thread" and will show you where you are located in the forum structure. Click on "<u>N4C</u>" and you will go back to the Front Page.
- 6. There is more help under the topic "INTRODUCTION, INFORMATION and YOU".
- 7. **SUBSCRIBE FOR EMAILS**. Go to the Front Page. Click on the "e" (Email) button above the "SEARCH ALL" and subscribe. You will get emails from "Yuku Team" when there is a post to the N4C Forum. If you want to cancel subscriptions, click the "e" again and make the change.
- 8. If you have a question or problems contact me (Ken Johnson) at web@n4c.us.
