President's Message

Hello! Another month gone by and closer to spring each passing day. Thinking of spring brings to mind Springbrook Weekend. Ken has lined up a busy and informative weekend, so it is time to sign up and make plans to be there. I'm hoping to see you all April 29-May 1.

February is a good time to get out and photograph eagles. They are concentrated on the rivers and streams where there is open water. In our area that is below the Red Rock Dam at Pella, the dam in downtown Des Moines , the dam in Cedar Rapids and any of the locks and dams on the Mississippi River. We have had several around Marshalltown all winter, and one pair is building a nest. This last weekend we ventured down to Cedar Rapids to collect some images at the roller dam. There were between fifty to seventy-five eagles fishing and sitting in the trees.



We have had a barred owl hanging around our house for the last week. It perches on the pole our bird feeders hang on. At first we thought it was waiting for birds for lunch, but noticed it was always looking down. It seems that mice come out to get dropped bird seed and Mr. Owl then has lunch. I have seen it setting on a shepherd hook at the end of our drive several times. I like to share these sightings and called Mike and Chris O'Riley. They came over Saturday morning and Mike looked all over and couldn't find the bird as usual. Then, after they left, Chris called me and reported that he was on the shepherd hook at the end of the drive. We all collected some images of the owl. However, he must be shy because he didn't want to look at us.

Those clubs' images that weren't judged were allowed to send doubles in this month. Geotagging Photos

With a packed schedule at Springbrook, there are two late evening sessions beginning at 9:15 pm to cover topics of

special side-interest related to photography (for those who are not card players). On Friday the session is on tagging photos with GPS locations. For landscape photographers and for other reasons of documentation it is helpful to record GPS location data to include in the metadata of photos. This can quickly link a photo to something like Google maps and pin point the location of the shot. I will show the workflow of

using a hand-held GPS unit and software to synchronize the files, load into Photoshop Lightroom and link to

common mapping programs.

This will cover how I do it. Members are encouraged to share their techniques with each other at this session. There are also devices that mount on the camera to do this. Please let Ken Johnson web@n4c.us know if you

are tagging photos and how you are doing it.

The Saturday late session is about genealogy and using photography skills to document family history. See the program notes on the web. The child in the photo is my grandfather. There are so many aspects

Greetings N4C Digital Contacts,

It is my hope that you will find this interesting and forward this information to your interested club members.

I want to share with you a tremendous instructive resource for digital photography for improving not only shooting, but processing techniques. It is the Photography School on "The Mindful Eye" website:

http://www.tmelive.com/

In the last article I wrote on "Color Perception" (Part 5) for the N4C Bulletin, I included a critique of one of my photos by Craig Tanner of "The Mindful Eye" http://n4c.yuku.com/reply/108#reply-108. I have attended three of his workshops and can say that his teachings have greatly improved my photography and knowledge of Photoshop. Craig is very generous to include much of his workshop material on his website and it is FREE but you must "JOIN" to see the content which is nearly all in video form. I think I am being truthful to say that you could expect to pay several thousand dollars for the instruction you will find here at no charge. You do not need to worry about being added to other mailing lists.

I have included below one of the TME "Photography School Newsletters" sent to me, and is typical of what may come several times per month if you join. This particular email was particularly interesting for land-scape photographers. Craig does "Daily Critiques" based on photos contributed by members. You can see a thumbnail in the email message of what I would judge, as-is, to be a below-average photo. However, see Craig's transformation. Click the links in this email and watch the two videos where he finds strengths in the photo and impressively enhances the lighting and colors by demonstrating each of the steps in Photoshop. He discusses a lot about composition and color theory in his narrative. Consider using what you learn and demonstrate it at a camera club meeting with your photos.

Now if you found that interesting, click on the "CONTENT" link at the top left of the website. These main topics lead to much more instruction. In particular, I find the following headings to be at the top of my list.

- FOUNDATION CONCEPTS: Material from many of his workshop lectures using his own photography as examples. He will reference this material in critiques rather than continually going into a lot of detail.
- DAILY CRITIQUES: Learn by examples contributed by others. Two more landscape examples from Yosemite (Sept 8 & 9) were interesting. You will also find portraits, abstracts and other subjects.
- DIGITAL DARKROOM: Craig uses pretty basic Photoshop tools. He is not a believer in selections. He is strong on adjustment layers and simple masking and will show how to prepare a fine photo from start to finish.

I just felt like sharing this with you. The only satisfaction I hope to receive is helping you improve your photography, and that you will share similar tips to improve mine. That is the real benefit of N4C. I'd love to hear from you.

The Photo Essay Revisited

Unless you've been hiding under a rock, you can't avoid the photo essay format and you really wouldn't want to after all. TV commercials are short, targeted, and interesting to view. Would you want to give up the commercials on Super Bowl Sunday? One of the widgets on my computer has short stories from the BBC such as this link: http://www.bbc.co.uk/news/world-latin-america-12360013. This one even mentions a special image stabilized lens that can be used a kilometer away from the subject. I played a few winners of the photo essay contest from previous years for our club. Members remembered these entries from previous years and enjoyed the second view as much or more as the first time through! The "Play it Again!" best describes this impact factor—a great story well told.

There are more software choices this year than last and ease of use has been substantially improved in many of these choices. The use of N4C competition size images work well while music can come from iTunes (difficult or impossible to edit downloads), CD's, or in some cases sound files within the software. Royalty free music clips are included in iMovie 2011 (http://store.apple.com/us/product/MC623Z/A/iLife-11?mco=MTk5MjkxMjU) and in the new offering from Photo Dex, ProShow Web (http://web.photodex.com/). If you also wish to add narration to your photo essay, you can use files with the built in voice recording features of many newer laptops, iPods or a digital recorder. Sound editing of multiple tracks is possible in ProShow Gold, iMovie 2006 and iMovie 2011. iMovie 2011 has automated sound adjustments of two tracks (with narration, music track is reduced in volume).

The last component is converting a slide to DVD format (<u>not Blueray!</u>). In addition to the links abovemore links are below:

There are some critical shortcomings with some software. Lightroom makes beautiful slide shows and DVDs—but compatibility issues make it difficult to add sound files. The newer programs have the Ken Burns effect built in to every slide that can be mildly to very irritating to some viewers. The latest issue [March 2011] of MAC WORLD has a way to remove the Ken Burns Effect on all slides (Page 87) in iMovie 2011! ProShow web has an additional charge of a \$30 annual fee to add the capability to burn DVDs from this web-based program.

Winners Get Help

I would like to relate a personal story. My adult son competed in a triathlon last summer - this is to swim, bike, and run in that order. He blew a tire on the bike leg with five miles yet to bike. He was prepared, carrying a new tube and 2 cylinders of compressed air. With the tube replaced, both air cylinders failed for him. Not willing to be defeated he picked up his bike and began to run the course with it. I must explain that help by spectators violates the rules; however competitors may help each other. Soon after, a biker from behind yelled, "Need Air?" My son, still running answered, "YES". The two of them inflated the tire. The girl who helped just said, "Now GO!" and would not let him stay to help put away her pump. Such kindness gave him the extra incentive needed and he was greeted at the finish line by his wife and three young daughters. Reflecting, he wrote about the experience under the title "No one helps a loser" and his belief that no one would have helped if he had hung his head and pulled off the course. My corollary is "Winners get help".

One of the great things about camera clubs and N4C is that many of us are anxious to help fellow members. Even though we are competitors, there is a lot of satisfaction in helping other members and seeing them improve. Realize that no matter how good you are, there is still someone who may recognize your shortcomings and be willing to help you improve. However, help won't come if you give up or decline it. Compliment other members when you like their work whether or not they receive an award. Be a mentor to someone. It will strengthen you and your club. And for N4C, actively participate and be a judging club as it will strengthen the membership of our camera club council.
