2024 N4C Fall Convention "Think, Imagine, Create in Siouxland"

October 3-5, 2024, Ponca State Park, Ponca, Nebraska

Registration is still open through September 20, 2024.

The Sioux City Camera Club's Convention Committees have developed details of the 2024 N4C Convention, "Think, Imagine, Create in Siouxland". Ponca State Park the headquarters of the convention provides a unique opportunity to photograph a public recreation area located on the banks of the Missouri River four miles (6.4 km) north of Ponca, Nebraska, in the northeastern corner of the state.

Ponca State Park's approximately 2,100 acres are situated among high bluffs and steep, forested hills adjacent to the <u>National Recreational River</u>.

The Park is noted for its biodiversity Eastern woodland flowers. The wild plum and gooseberry thickets were also noted by the Lewis & Clark Expedition who passed these bluffs with their Corps of Discovery in the summer of 1804. Forested ravines and hillsides contain many unique trees.

White-tailed deer and wild turkey are commonly seen. Coyotes, and red-grey foxes and bobcats are often spotted. This area is also known for the concentrations of waterfowl that congregate during the spring and fall migrations. The barred owl is a vocal resident, and wintering bald eagles are often sighted.

If I should contact someone different, please let me know. IF YOUR CLUB ENTERS PRINTS, SEE BELOW FOR WHERE TO SEND ENTRIES.

FOR DIGITAL ENTRIES, they must be received by 5:00 pm September 15, however make every effort to send them by the 13th to allow time for confirmation.

- Judging may begin on the 16th - make sure you receive confirmation that entries were received.

The cutoff time will be 5:00pm on the 15th giving the judging chair time to organize them for judging starting on the 16th. The point is.... don't wait until the last minute. There have been problems with occasionally missing entries when they are not received until late in the night on the 15th.

There are six Digital Image Contests each month - (see the definitions of each category in the Rules):

Altered Reality (DA)

Black & White (DB)

Journalism (DJ)

Nature (DN)

Pictorial (DP)

Travel (DT)

Maximum of 8 entries per club per contest, not more than one from a member in each contest

Do not enter versions of the same image in multiple contests. For example, do not enter both a color and B&W version in the same month. Likewise, don't enter both Digital & print versions. If both win, one will be withdrawn. The rule is: "Any entry which receives a 1st, 2nd, 3rd, or HM award in a monthly competition may not be reentered in the same year or later years, in the same or any other category, regardless of variations or changes made."

Please check your entries before sending them on for judging. Look for three things:

- 1. File size 750KB max. (A requirement this year)
- 2. Longest side 1,920 pixels max.
- 3. File name should look like this example: 01,DE028,DP,Beautiful Sunset.jpg

Content of the Email Message when you send the entries:

- a. Subject Line of the Email should say "N4C Contest Entries from _(your)_ Camera Club".
- b. Specify which monthly contest and how many images are attached to the Email.
- c. List the Member Numbers and corresponding member names to ensure that the Judging Club has that information.
- d. Give the Club Name and your full name.
- e. Attach the image files

ASK THE JUDGING CLUB IF YOU DO NOT GET A RECEIVED CONFIRMATION BACK FROM THEM

Please send me updated member lists when you have added Member Numbers. I'm glad to see new members participating in N4C contests. Naturally I need to get them registered so they are properly identified for the judging clubs. For new members, that really should be done a month in advance of entering.

(Entries must be received by 5:00 pm September 15, however make every effort to send them by the 13th to allow time for confirmation.

- Judging may begin on the 16th - make sure you receive confirmation that entries were received)

A club will normally have up to 8 entries for a contest. A typical image file name list might look like:

(USE YOUR CLUB NAME AND MEMBER NUMBER INSTEAD OF DA044 - zero "0" 44 not a letter "O")

(USE DA, DB, DJ, DN, DP, or DT for the Contest Code - This example is for the Digital Nature Contest)

(Notice commas separating the data in the file names) 01,DA044,DN,Deer.jpg

03,DA022,DN,Grand Arch.jpg

04,DA033,DN,Teton Reflection.jpg

05,DA037,DN,White Water.jpg

06,DA002,DN,Shadows.jpg

07,DA025,DN,Horsetail Falls.jpg

08,DA018,DN,Soaring Eagle.jpg

Members should submit entries with filenames like the above except for the sequence numbers. The club N4C Rep will rename the files to include the sequence numbers. The club N4C Rep may want to keep things simple for the club members and handle ALL the file naming - how this is done is left to the club. The sequence numbers will determine the sequencing of the image in the judging line-up. All the contest entries will be sorted in alpha-numeric sequence by filename so this will mix up club entries for judging. The 01's from all the clubs will be judged first and the 08's at the end.

Tips for Urban Landscape

Photography

The first thing most beginners get to photograph is the urban landscape around them. It's easily accessible, generous in terms of subject matters, and fair in terms of gear. Furthermore, the urban landscape is full of stories waiting for someone to capture them. You can find endless ways to portray a city. For that reason and many others, many photographers fall in love with urban landscape photography and never grow apart from it. But what makes urban landscape photography such a beloved photographic genre, and how can you master it?

What is Urban Landscape Photography?

Urban landscape photography is a photographic genre that uses a town or city as its subject. From popular metropolis to vibrant cities to silent little towns, the urban landscape provides many insights into human civilization. It focuses on groups of people rather than on individuals and celebrates the achievements of mankind: architecture, art, social life, commerce, and so on.

Where Can You Capture Urban Landscape Photos?

The most common vantage points for urban landscape photography are historical city centers, popular squares or boulevards, and, of course, points that provide wide cityscape views. However, you can find more intimate and less crowded places that offer a glimpse into the city's history or lifestyle. You may consider taking photos near a flower market at dawn, walking along a river that crosses the city, or getting lost in an art or café district. Give yourself a moment to take in the atmosphere and feel its vibrations. Urban landscape photography is not just about photographing beautiful or interesting places, but also about telling stories.

Explore the Full Range of Subject Matters

Urban landscape photography provides the obvious subjects, such as buildings, bridges, streets, cars, and people. It also provides less obvious subjects, such as architectural details, trees and flowers, foods and drinks, shop windows, restaurants, and so on. You can find meaningful neon signs and billboards, animals and tiny insects, and exquisite murals and graffiti.

At the same time, you have conceptual subjects to take your photography to the next level. You may choose to focus on social issues and contrasts or choose to document a particular activity or location.

Focus on Storytelling

In most urban environments you'll find landmarks, buildings and architectural details, cobbled streets, parks and gardens, bridges, and squarest rush hour. However, all these can be photographed by anyone. Why should your photos be special?

What differentiates your photos from those of other photographers is the story you tell. You need a narrative that goes beyond the visual aspects. Try to embed in your urban landscape photographs a little bit of history, psychology, and color theory, a temporal element, and a concept. Aim to take meaningful photos rather than just beautiful ones.

Find the Meaning of Wanderlust

If walking around the city without any purpose or direction is not your natural inclination, you may struggle to capture its essence. Even the best camera and most masterful technique won't help you here. You can't look at a place only through your lens and hope to take authentic pictures. They will be beautiful but empty. Seek out the power of wanderlust, adopt the mindset of an explorer, and the meditative experience of taking in the city atmosphere to open your vision. Urban landscape photography is a popular genre.

Thus, you need a real passion and dedication to take unique photographs and create an authentic style. Invest as much time and energy in learning photography techniques and composition as you do in walking around and taking in the moods of a place. Know its history and lifestyle before pressing the shutter release. Look for an intimate encounter with the city.

More Essentials but Underused Camera Features

Histogram

Think of the histogram as a visual cheat-sheet for photographing bright tones. To render a subject as true white, you want the data on the right-hand side to be as close to the edge of the graph (histogram) as possible.

This will indicate a crisp exposure rather than a muddy, grey appearance. As you change the exposure to let in more light, the histogram will inch towards the right.

Keep adjusting your settings until it's literally just a hair from the outer wall. You are now maximizing all the wonderful dynamic range of which your cameras capable. Once the data collides with the right-hand wall of the histogram, you've technically overexposed part of your scene. This means there is no detail in the highlights, but rather a hotspot that is impossible to recover, even with sophisticated software. While this data is valuable, it doesn't tell you exactly where the trouble spot is in your scene. This is where the "highlight alert" becomes a helpful aid.

Live View

If you've ever struggled to achieve autofocus at night, or desire more accuracy for macro work, Live View will be your new favorite mode. With it, you can zoom in on a tiny portion of a subject at 5x and 10x magnification.

This extreme close-up gives you the ability to carefully micro-focus on whatever is most important in your scene. Just note, the enlarged view on your LCD is not representative of your lens' effective focal length. Upon pressing the shutter, the entire scene will still be captured in sharp detail. You'll be amazed at the level of precision possible. For the ultimate in control, use this with manual focus and a sturdy tripod.

Live View is not only useful for focus, but composition as well. For example, if your DSLR lacks a tilt or swivel screen, shooting from ground level can be a real challenge. With a live image on the LCD however, there's no need to crane your neck for viewfinder access. The same idea can be applied to those crowded situations when you must raise the camera over your head. Instead of shooting blind, you can use Live View to better compose the shot.
