





N4C Photo Contests: The way to win IS TO PLAY.

Why Judging Makes You a Better Photographer

September marks the start of a brand-new season of N4C contests, running through next May! One of the biggest benefits of being part of an N4C-affiliated club is the opportunity to enter (and judge!) these monthly competitions. You will discover locations you'll want to visit.

Here's why judging photos—and having your own judged—will make you a better photographer:

1. Having Your Photos Judged Helps You Grow

Think of it this way: you love your own photo, but others may see something you missed. Judges provide fresh perspectives and honest feedback. Don't worry about ribbons – think of it as free coaching from peers who share your passion.

One person may swoon over your sunrise, another may prefer your moody fog shot. That's the beauty of it. Photography is subjective. The feedback you receive isn't about winning or losing; it's about learning what works and why.

Plus, contests give you a reason to share your work regularly, which keeps you shooting, editing, and improving.

2. Judging Trains Your Eye

When you sit down to judge, you're exposed to dozens of images from hobbyists like you. You learn to ask: Why does this photo work? What could make it stronger? That process sharpens your skills for your own photography.

You're training your photographer's eye. You're forced to ask: What makes this one more powerful than that one? It's like eating at 20 different restaurants in one night – you quickly figure out what you like, what you don't, and why the garnish matters.

Judging makes you sharper, more observant,

and (bonus!) less likely to keep 500 "almost identical" shots of the same waterfall.

3. Don't Take It Personally

Photography is subjective. Sometimes the eagle-in-flight loses to a rusty doorknob. It happens. The key is to learn, laugh, and keep shooting. (Besides, barns and doorknobs need love too.)

Not everyone will pick your photo as the "best." That's okay! Judges are human (most of them, anyway). One may love leading lines; another may go crazy for bright colors. If your masterpiece doesn't take home a ribbon, it doesn't mean it's not great – it just means you've added another viewpoint to your understanding of photography.

Quick Tips for First-Time Judges

When you volunteer to judge an N4C contest, remember: you're not looking for perfection you're looking for balance. Each image is scored on three main criteria:

1. Technique

- Sharp focus, good lighting, natural color, proper exposure
- For prints: overall print quality counts too

2. Composition

- Are the elements arranged in a pleasing way?
- Is the subject clear and well-framed?
- Does the photo feel balanced?

3. Interest

- Originality, imagination, and storytelling
- Does the subject grab you?
- Is there impact, mood, or maybe even a touch of humor?

Photos are scored by three judges. Don't stress – just be honest, thoughtful, and fair. Remember, your feedback helps others grow, and you'll sharpen your own skills along the way!

4. Making Judging Easier

Each month, one club volunteers to judge entries from other clubs. It's peer-to-peer learning at its finest. A few tips to keep it smooth:

- Three judges to balance out personal tastes.
- Score consistently on composition, impact, and technical skill.
- Share *why* a photo stands out—members learn from your words.
- **Remember it's educational.** No cash prizes here—just learning, growth, and maybe a nice certificate to hang next to your fridge magnets.

In the End...

N4C contests aren't about winning or losing. They're about learning, improving, and connecting with other photographers. By entering—and volunteering to judge—you'll grow your skills and keep your club strong.

So the next time your club needs judges, don't hide behind your tripod. Don't just enter—consider raising your hand to judge. Who knows? The next time you're out shooting, you might find yourself saying, "Ah, now that's a photo with impact!"

EXPOSURE 101: Aperture, Shutter Speed and Iso


Western Wisconsin Photography Club March 7, 2012

Photography is about capturing light.

Aperture, shutter and ISO affect the light the camera sees.


APERTURE

- Aperture is the size of the opening between the lens and the film or sensor.
- Aperture is measured in f-stops.
- F-stop measurement is inverse to the opening size.
- Small openings have large f-stop number.
- Large openings have small f-stop number.



APERTURE

One full f-stop change exposes the film or sensor to double (or half) the light



SHUTTER SPEED

- Shutter speed is the length of time the film or sensor is exposed to light.
- It is how long the camera's "eye" is open.
- It is measured usually in fractions of a second.
- Shutter speed is the length of time the film or sensor is exposed to light.
- It is how long the camera's "eye" is open.
- It is measured usually in fractions of a second.
 - ☐ Fast shutter speeds expose the film or sensor to less light.
 - □ Slow shutter speeds expose the film or sensor to more light.


- Standard shutter speeds:
- □ 1/1000 s
- □ 1/500 s
- □ 1/250 s
- □ 1/125 s
- □ 1/60 s
- □ 1/30 s
- □ 1/15 s
- □ 1/8 s
- □ 1/4 s
- \Box 1/2 s
- 1 s

One shutter step exposes the film or sensor to double (or half) the light

Aperture and Shutter Speed Striking the Right Balance

- The correct exposure of light balances aperture and shutter speed.
- See-saw analogy where one end rises, the opposite end falls by an equal amount.





ISO

- International Standards Organization.
- Uniform measurement system for sensitivity of digital camera sensors.
- Similar to film speed.
- Low ISO means sensor is less sensitive to light.
- High ISO means sensor is more sensitive to light.

•	Standard ISO speeds: 100 200 400 800	Full step change in ISO doubles (or halves) the sensitivity of the sensor.
	1600 3200 6400	Equivalent to step change in the shutter speed or the aperture.

Effects of Aperture, Shutter Speed and ISO besides regulating amount of light

•	Shutter Speed: Controls the depiction of motion in the image.
	☐ Fast shutter speed freezes the motion of the subject.
	☐ Slow shutter speed blurs the motion.
•	Shutter Speed: Controls the depiction of motion in the image.
	\Box Fast shutter speed freezes the motion of the subject.
	☐ Slow shutter speed blurs the motion.
